

Student Association Elections 2008-9

In the Spring Term each year, we hold elections for the Student Association Committee. The positions are open to any student (subject to the approval of the Personal Tutor) who is in the first year of a two-year course and the term of office is one year, from Easter 2008 to Easter 2009. These are significant posts, and universities and employers hold in high regard students who have held such offices.

Student President and Vice President

Whilst all the posts are important, the most significant positions are those of Student President and Vice President. Both act as important ambassadors for the College and are involved in all its public functions - so public speaking is an essential element of these posts. This year, both the Student President and the Vice President will be Governors of the College and will be expected to attend all Governors' meetings and sit on some of the Governors' Committees.

Thus the roles of Student President and Vice President present an excellent opportunity to develop leadership skills within the student community and to contribute to the corporate governance of a College with an annual income of approximately £15 million.

The time commitment is not excessive - but meetings need to take precedence over part-time jobs, and time-management skills need to be sufficiently well-developed to manage A-level deadlines.

We will use the Single Transferable Vote (STV) system for all posts. Students will rank the candidates in order of preference and the elected officer will be the first candidate to reach 50% of the available votes, after transfers if necessary. The Vice President will be the runner up in the election for the President.

Other Student Association Posts

Treasurer: monitors the SA funds and keeps up to date accounts.

Secretary: organises all meetings, including Student Council; records minutes.

Events Officer: organises and publicises a variety of social and other events.

Charities Officer: organises a variety of fundraising events including the students' RAG week.

Publications Editor: leads the editorial team - College Magazine and Year Book.

Teaching for Learning Officer: represents the views of the student body on the development of teaching excellence, and sits on the Governors' Curriculum and Quality Committee and also on the College's Equality and Diversity Committee.

Environment Officer: encourages us all to place environmental issues high on the agenda, individually and collectively.

Sports Officer: represents the activities of the many sports teams in the College and will organise an Inter-Tutor Group Sporting Event in 2008-9.

Performing Arts Officer: represents the activities of the many students engaged in performing arts in the College.

Community Links Officer: encourages and organises community activities by Collegestudents, liaising closely with Jenny Osborne, Lead Tutor for enrichment.

Student President Mo Saqib says:

"Being part of the Student Association means being part of an active and ambitious committee that aims to make the College lives of students extra special.

Not only do the SA organise a variety of fun events but they also work alongside members of staff (including the Principal!) who will seek the views of the SA when any issues affecting the students are raised. Alongside my vast responsibilities as Student President, I've had the opportunity to make a real difference to the College community whilst also having some immensely rewarding experiences. My time in the SA may be almost over, but I have learnt a great deal over the past year whilst also having a fantastic time. It is for this reason that, if you are thinking of running in the Student Association elections, I would fully encourage you to stand".

As usual, we expect students to accompany parents in order to make the discussion as helpful and fruitful as possible.

When you arrive, please go straight to your first appointment. Should you need a map, it can be collected from either the main entrance to the College or the rear entrance near to Time Out. The map will show you where the tutors are located.

Students will be able to make appointments nearer the time on Appointment Forms to be completed on your behalf.

Please note that:

- 1 subject tutors will be in their normal teaching locations;
- 2 the careers adviser will be in College each evening and will be pleased to make an appointment to see you;
- 3 when making appointments, students should build in plenty of walking time between locations;
- 4 if you wish to see the student's personal tutor, it is best to see him or her last;
- 5 teachers do try to keep to time - please do not assume that the interview is endless! If you wish to have an extended meeting, this should be arranged separately.

Second Year Students in need of help

The above parents' evenings will also be available to parents of second year students who are experiencing difficulty. If you have concerns, please ask your son or daughter to make appointments with their subject tutors.

Review Data

Short-hand data concerning students' progress in terms of attendance, the standard at which they are currently working, and time-management have already been sent to you. Students on AS courses have undertaken a January Subject Review; you can ask to see their action plans on CristalWeb which will form the basis of discussions at the parents' evenings. AS and A2 module results will have been published by the time of the meetings.

MISUSE OF THE COLLEGE NETWORK

Occasionally, we have examples of misuse of the College Network. The College Network is principally for study-related activity and the storing or transmitting of inappropriate or offensive messages and images is a disciplinary matter, as it is in the workplace; trading from College e-mail addresses is similarly forbidden. In these circumstances, disciplinary measures will always be taken which could lead to suspension and/or exclusion from the College. Any students who **receive** offensive messages or images by e-mail should notify the Help Desk immediately.

Should illegal material or images be stored or transmitted, the College will not hesitate to inform the police immediately.

Summer Examinations 2008

Coursework Deadlines - all courses

Every year, some students find that they miss deadlines because they manage their time poorly. Please check with your son or daughter if deadlines are approaching and encourage them to plan ahead.

Plagiarism - don't get disqualified

A reminder to all students. Coursework must be the work of the student alone. In the past, on occasions and often in panic, work has been copied from other candidates. **This will always lead to disqualification from the examination.** If a student lends work to another student "to help him out" or "because she is a good friend and she said she wouldn't copy it directly", it is likely that his or her entry will also be disqualified.

Never lend coursework or research notes to another student - and if there is a real difficulty, always consult your subject tutor over sharing of work.

When writing an extended essay, all references must be fully acknowledged. If students find helpful paragraphs in a book or on the Internet, they must not copy and paste it into their own essays in the pretence that they have written it. It is likely that the examiner will recognise it - and the work will then be disqualified.

IN THE EXAMINATION ROOM

Mobile phones are banned

Do not take mobile phones into the examination room. Possession of mobile phones in an examination will lead to disqualification.

They should be left at home or with a friend. For a fee of £1 to cover the summer examination period, they can also be deposited at the College Finance Office for safe-keeping.

Final revision notes

Do not have final notes in your pocket during an examination. Even if there is no intention to use them, possession will result in disqualification. In the past, a student who has sneezed has pulled from a pocket a handkerchief and revision notes have fallen to the floor. The College is required to report this and disqualification will almost certainly result.

The Examination Boards do not accept lack of familiarity with their rules as an excuse.

Students can access their individual examination timetables via CRISTAL Web after the Easter Vacation.

Students are advised to make a significant start on their revision during the Easter Vacation.

In August, a post examination results service is provided by the College staff together with the local careers advisers. Details of this will be included with the examination results.

College tops Southern England table

The College achieved the best results out of all colleges in the south of England, according to the league tables published by the government last month. According to the tables, the average A level points score per student of 1036.4 makes it the top college in Hampshire, Surrey, Sussex and second in the whole of England.

Last year, over 800 students moved on to universities across the country making the College one of Britain's most significant sources of undergraduates.

On a recent visit to the College, Dr Ken Boston, Head of the Government's Qualifications and Curriculum Authority, said, "Farnborough Sixth Form College is nationally recognised for its outstanding teaching and commitment to developing innovative approaches to develop teaching and learning. There is no finer institution in the country in which you could have studied for your qualifications".

Budding Publishers produce Budding Press



Congratulations to Maria Burova and Edward Taylor who, together with two of their friends who were also former Winston Churchill students, have produced four editions of a new publication, The Budding Press. Edward, who is a second year student at the College and has just secured a place at Clare College, Cambridge, to study History, is the Editor in Chief. He said, "Our aim is to provide a forum in which young writers can publish 'serious' material - by which we mean well-written and well-argued rather than 'unfunny'".

The first three volumes were written entirely by the team of four but for the fourth edition, the editorial board decided to open the journal to external contributors. Maria, who is one of the sub-editors said, "Our latest edition has ten authors, some from the College but others from contributors as far north as Durham and as far south as Southampton".

After the concert, Principal John Guy, said, "Joanna was an inspiration, not only for the Farnborough Music Society but especially for the many A level music students at the College who were able to see, hear and engage with a world class pianist in the College's own theatre. Joanna's challenging explanations of her arrangements of major musical works gave rare insights into the mind and thinking of a renowned musician".

College team reaches National Public Speaking Finals



Congratulations to Simon Wood, Marisa Barnard and Georgia Stilwell who have won the Local, the District and the Regional finals (held in London on 15 February) of the Rotary "Youth Speaks" Public Speaking Competition.

The team, who faced tough competition from schools and colleges in the Rushmore heat, then went on to win the District round held in Camberley before winning the wider Surrey and Home Counties competition held at Kingston College in February. On Friday 15 February they faced other winning teams in a competition held in London and emerged as the winners yet again.

Can you write Haiku for the new Building?



The College is holding a competition for students to write Haiku verse which might be embedded into glass panels within the atrium of the proposed new building. The Haiku could relate to any aspect of College life in learning and creativity - but might well focus on aspects of art, science and computing which will be housed in the building, or on the idea of sustainability in new building design.

Haiku is a poetic form and a type of poetry from the Japanese culture. Haiku combines form, content, and language in a meaningful, yet compact form. Haiku poets write about everyday things. Many themes include nature, feelings, or experiences. Usually they use simple words and grammar. The most common form for Haiku is three short lines containing 17 syllables. The first line usually contains five (5) syllables, the second line seven (7) syllables, and the third line contains five (5) syllables. Haiku doesn't rhyme. A Haiku must "paint" a mental image in the reader's mind. This is the challenge of Haiku - to put the poem's meaning and imagery in the reader's mind in only 17 syllables and just three lines of poetry!

Further details of the competition open to all students will be published before Easter. There could be up to six different glass panels each containing a Haiku - winners will receive £100 and their names will also be embedded into the glass panel - for posterity!

College students launch new Farnborough Fun

On Sunday 30 March, approximately 400 fun runners will race around the town of Farnborough in the Inaugural Farnborough 6 Fun Run. A group of 19 A2 Leisure students have taken on the challenge of creating a significant community event. College Attendance and Illness

The vast majority of students attend regularly and on time - that is the College requirement. A few, however, seem to miss classes for apparently trivial reasons, often quoting medical appointments or sudden illness which smites them down for 24 hours. In these circumstances, parents will be asked to verify absences.

It is timely to point out that all references refer to attendance records and, given the demand for places at the College, those with a poor attendance will not necessarily be retained in College for a second year. Where attendance falls below 90%, the College Charter makes it clear that the student's place at the College will be put in jeopardy.

4th in Country for Cambridge Success Rate

On average across schools and colleges entering students for Cambridge, 25% of applicants are offered a place - ie about 1 in 4; the competition is very tough and sometimes it is difficult to understand why good candidates have been turned down.

For the College, this year, the success rate was 44% - we have been told that only 3 other schools in the country had a higher success rate. In terms of the numbers of students offered places at Cambridge, the College has the ninth highest number out of all schools and colleges in the country.

The College has arranged for students to park their cars at the nearby Farnborough Football Club because of the limited number of car parking spaces on the College site.

The College is situated in a residential neighbourhood and I am sure everybody will recognise and understand the irritation and distress which is caused to residents if they come home and find they are unable to park outside their own house in a quiet residential street because a student has parked there instead.

It would be helpful if parents would support the College in discussing with students their responsibility as citizens to respect the expectations of local home-owners. It may be legal to park outside someone's house - but when mothers with small children cannot unload shopping near their house, it becomes anti-social.
